PRINCIPAL'S PERSPECTIVE

Dear Parents and Caregivers,

Last week our school hosted a Year 6 into Year 7 Information Night. Parents of Year 6 students were invited to share a barbecue dinner and hear about the opportunities that Oaklands Central School provides for our students. Being a smaller school, we have unique opportunities to provide the highest quality education for our students. In many larger schools, students are restricted in their choice of subjects in secondary school, as subject availability is based on popularity of subjects and the school's ability to fit subjects onto timetable lines. Our flexibility, our use of 21st Century technology and our membership in the Riverina Access Program allows us to provide students with any HSC subject they want to study. It also allows our students to pursue any career path that interests them, in the last few years we have had many students move onto university as well as sought after apprenticeships. In many schools, students are able to "drift along" in classes, as they are one student in a large class. Our smaller class sizes mean that teachers know their students well. We know each student's strengths and weaknesses and the way that they learn best. It also means that we target our teaching for each student and maximize their learning in every class. All students are able to achieve academically at Oaklands.

Oaklands provides a unique social environment for our students which is both nurturing and caring. Our students often work together in teams from across the school. In whole school

activities it is very noticeable how the older students look after and nurture the younger students. Younger students learn from older students, seeing the high school students unselfishly help our primary students, teaching them how to do new things and in the process growing in their leadership and citizenship skills themselves. When students do have issues, as all adolescents and children do, they are quickly noticed and supported by staff and students. And every student has the opportunity to participate in programs at our school. In larger schools a select group of students get the chance to join in choir, or debating or any other activity. Our smaller cohort means that any student has the opportunity to be part of most extra curricula activities. There is the real opportunity to have a go at anything and let their light shine.

I was very proud to have had the time at the Year 6 to 7 Information Night to explain to parents all the advantages an education at Oaklands Central School offers. I would also like to thank all the parents who were able to attend what was a really enjoyable evening.

If you haven't had the chance to visit our school website lately, I would strongly encourage a visit. HEAD TEACHER NEWS

Here at Oaklands Central School we are focussed on developing students to be self-motivated, life-long learners who can work independently and cooperatively, and take their place in the world with confidence, compassion and enthusiasm.

Oaklands Central School has been providing the district with public education since 1885. Whilst we are proud of our traditions we provide contemporary educational theory and practice with our 21st century educational focus.

Being a small school we have the capacity to cater for students individual learning needs. Our staff focus is on explicit teaching of skills and they pride themselves on the positive relationships we form with students and the quality feedback we can offer to help them produce work to their personal best standard.

Oaklands will be represented in Wagga Wagga at an SRC Student Leadership initiative next Tuesday for the Future Moves Forum Day where emergency response to critical incidents will be the focus of a training and response day with emergency Services from across the Riverina.

It has been a term of quality learning for the secondary students here at Oaklands with great success for effort.

The schools layer chooks were awarded 2nd place for presentation at The Sydney Royal Easter Show and 3rd in the project competition. We look forward with anticipation as to how the layers have gone in the laying section of the competition. The head judge was highly impressed with the animal husbandry skills our students have displayed in presenting the birds in such good condition with the severe weather conditions we endured prior to taking the chooks to Sydney.

The school has been invited to enter the National Poultry Competition to be hosted by NSW in June.

Students have been working on persuasive text writing in classes. Conversations at home where a student has to take a point of view and support their argument with logical, creative responses will help develop this skill in students. Enjoy the conversations and have a safe holiday come the end of week 11.

Updated advice for HSC students about examinations

Advice for HSC students about examinations has been updated on the Students Online website to include important information about the 2016 HSC examinations.

It covers a range of topics including revised syllabuses, changes to specifications and courses where personalised answer booklets are being introduced.

Schools are asked to let their students know that this information has been updated and direct them to the site.

Industrial Arts—Stage 4

Technology Mandatory is about the study of the design process and the steps taken to achieve what we call a design solution. The problem is based on social need and has been solved through the application of design principals and steps.

So in simple terms stage 4 are presented with a simple problem to solve eg, "My desk is always messy. I have trouble finding what I want when I need it."

Solution- design and make a desk tidy unit out of timber.

And so this is what stage 4 have been doing. However most of us have had little experience in design and so to lay the foundations, students are presented with a possible solution while there practical skills and knowledge of design principals is developed.

This desk tidy project also introduces students

to the practices of marking out, cutting, sanding, assembly techniques and the forestry principals of sustainability, hardwoods and softwoods as well as environmental considerations.

All design and manufacture should have a ethical component to it. Our project is made from plantation grown softwood and recycled hard wood. Man made timber product of ply is also used.

In the education context the project is at the top of the learning pyramid but quickly opens out towards the base into many technical and ethical considerations which are all part of the relevant curriculum for this subject.



Industrial Arts—Stage 5

The first project for the year in stage 5 is the wall/display hanging unit which is mainly an exercise in marking out and joint cutting. The frame is dovetailed while partitions are trenched into position. As well as this, students had to make a drawer.

Students have been given control over the layout of the unit, it's proportions and number of drawers. As well as this students, knowledge is built upon in the areas of marking out, tool selection and use, forestry practices and timber species. Stage 5 also look at the history and



social impact of forestry and timber technology. Again the idea is that while the project is at the top of the learning pyramid, the skill set and knowledge required quickly broaden out to cover many associated topics.

Technology subjects require a high level of literacy and numeracy if students are to achieve good results.

MOTOR TYPES

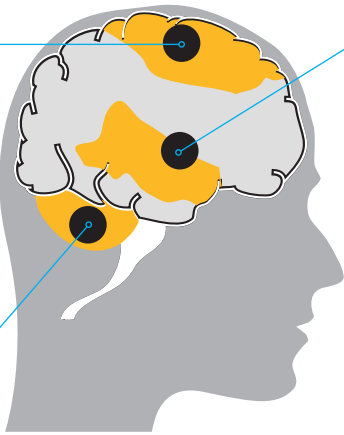
SPASTIC: 70-80%.
Most common form. Muscles appear stiff and tight. Arises from Motor Cortex damage.

DYSKINETIC: 6%.
Characterised by involuntary movements. Arises from Basal Ganglia damage.

MIXED TYPES:
Combination damage.

ATAXIC: 6%

Characterised by shaky movements. Affects balance and sense of positioning in space. Arises from Cerebellum damage.

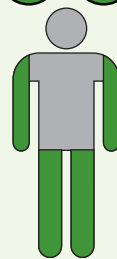


PARTS OF THE BODY

QUADRIPLEGIA/ BILATERAL:

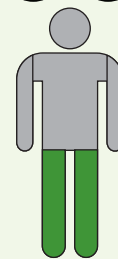
LIMBS AFFECTED

DIPLEGIA/ BILATERAL:

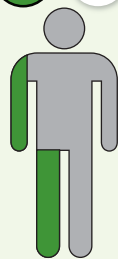
LIMBS AFFECTED

HEMIPLEGIA/ UNILATERAL:

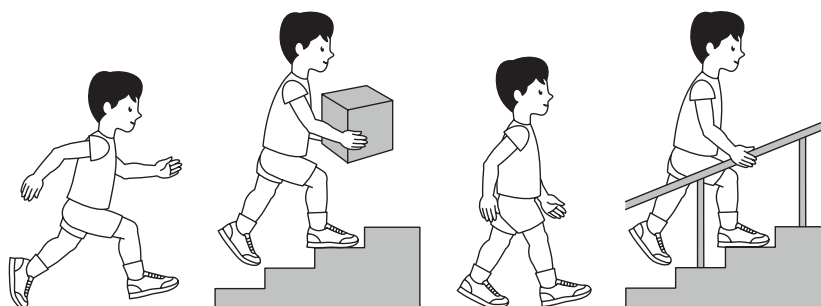
LIMBS AFFECTED

One side of the body (one arm and one leg) is affected

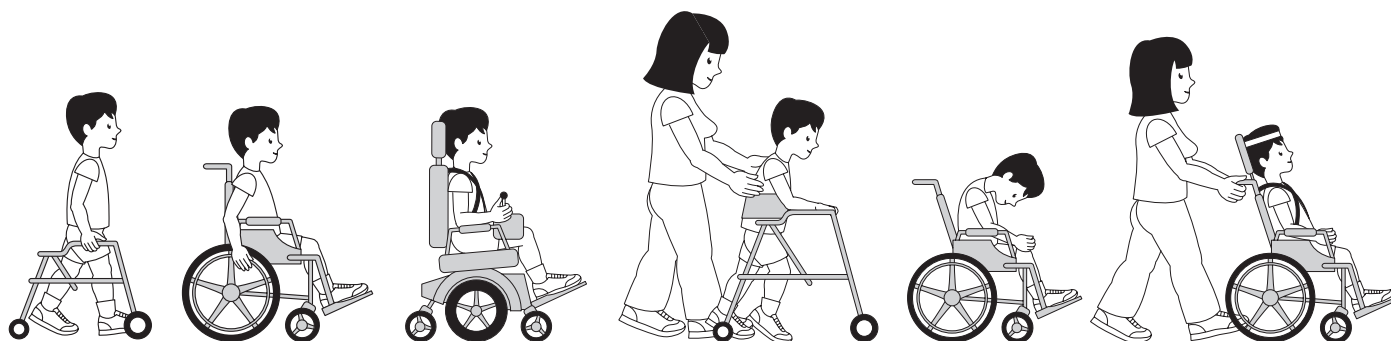
GROSS MOTOR SKILLS

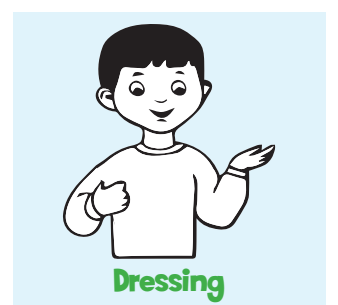
