Dear Parents and Caregivers,

It was great to hear how our students shone their lights at the Twilight Swimming Carnival last Thursday. The students showed great team spirit, with both houses singing their chants as they walked to the pool. Inside the competition was fierce but also conducted in wonderful spirit. One of many great aspects of our school is the way that the students support and look after each other. This is particularly true when our youngest swimmers take to the pool and swim their lap. Congratulations to Innes house on winning the carnival. Also congratulations to all of our age champions. And finally I would like to extend my congratulations to the parents who continue to dominate the Parent/Teacher/Student race. It was a well-deserved win!

There are a few changes that our community members need to be aware of:

Over the holiday break Oaklands Central School underwent some capital works, including the upgrading of our fencing and gates. The

gates offer better security and safety for our students. However, young students may not be able to reach the latch to open the gates. When dropping students off in the morning, please accompany young students to the gate and let them into the school grounds. It is also very important to make sure that our access gates are closed for the safety of students. If you notice an open gate, please assist us by shutting it. In the morning the school is supervised from 8:30am. We ask that students do not arrive at school earlier than 8:30am.

Recently new laws were passed regarding school speed zones. The new laws increase the fines and create some new offences. An outline of the changes are included in the newsletter. To avoid fines please make yourself aware of the changes.

This year is a busy year at the school. We keep an up to date calendar on the school website. Please visit the website regularly to keep up with everything that is happening at Oaklands Central School this year.

Currently the school is working very hard at finalising the School Plan 2018-2020. This is an

important document. The plan maps out the strategies the school and its community will put in place to continue to build excellence.

It builds on the great work the school does to allow our students to shine their light and reach their goals. The new School Plan looks at ways of improving student learning, teacher skills and the preparation of our students for work in the modern world through school community partnerships and links. We would appreciate feedback from our community on the draft plan. To find the draft plan please visit our website and then simply talk to the school or send us an email if you have any comments.

This year we are changing the way that we run assemblies in the school. We are going to move to Whole School Assemblies only, which promote and celebrate Oaklands Central School achievements across the whole school. The change means that instead of two types of assemblies, we will have Whole School Assemblies twice a term. They will generally occur on Wednesday Week 5 and Thursday Week 10. Each assembly will be run by students from each class on a rotating roster. At the assembly students will present a class item. Students will also receive awards based on the new merit system. There will be more information about the new merit system in the next newsletter. By having two assemblies each term it will provide greater opportunity for parents and community members to attend and

support our students and school. If you have any questions about these new arrangements please do not hesitate to contact the school.

Finally, I would like to congratulate Carlie Smith our Scripture teacher on the safe arrival of her son Tobias. This is very exciting news.

HEAD TEACHER NEWS

We have had a very bust start to the term, filled with many learning and sporting opportunities.

During Week 3 our Year 11 students travelled to Yanco to participate in the RAP Induction Camp. This enabled students to meet their coordinating teachers face to face and build relationships with their fellow peers. Thank you to Mr Craft and Mrs Davis who helped with transporting the students.

Last Thursday night we held our annual Swimming Carnival. Well done to all secondary students who competed and assisted with jobs on the night. Furthermore, well done to the House Captains who proved they were effective leaders by encouraging and organising their teams. Well done to Innes!

As we start off the year there are number of things we have been reinforcing with our students. We ask as parents and carers, for you to support us and remind students of the following expectations in Secondary:

Expected Behaviour—students are encouraged to participate in all learning activities and take ownership of their learning progress. They will

benefit the most from following teacher instructions and utilising feedback to further improve.

Home Learning Centre- the Home Learning Centre is open second half of lunch and is supervised by a member of the executive. Students are able to access the centre to complete assessments tasks or get extra assistance with learning. Furthermore students may be placed in the centre for poor behaviour or attitude in class, not completing set classwork or as a discipline consequence.

Uniform and phones- to promote school pride, students are encouraged to wear school uniform daily. If students are unable to wear the set uniform they should bring in a signed note from their parent or carer. Due to issues with mobile phones in the past, student use of mobile phones at OCS is restricted. Students are encouraged not to use their phones at recess and lunch and socialise with their peers. Furthermore if a student is using their phone during class or break time without permission, they may be asked to hand it in at the front office to be collected at the end of the day.

Student laptops- students have access to two laptop options at OCS. Firstly students may loan a new laptop for \$35 a term, which enables them to use it at school and at home. Secondly we have older laptops that students may use at school only, after signing the charter agreement. Stu-

dents at OCS are very lucky to have access to technology daily.

Assessment Booklets- over the next couple of weeks, students in Stage 4 and 5 will be issued with a booklet outlining their subject assessment schedules for the year. This should provide students with a guide for managing their learning loads. Please don't hesitate to contact the school if you have any questions.

Electives- students in Years 8/9/10 have now chosen their electives for the year. Please note that many electives take quite a large budget to run, therefore we support these budgets through elective fees. The elective fees enable students to take their projects or creations home. Please look out for an elective fee notice over the next couple of weeks.

Personalised Learning Plans (PLPs)- all students in Secondary have a PLP to support and guide their learning. All students have completed their own personal reflection of their learning. Last week we sent home a letter encouraging parents to complete a parent reflection to in turn provide feedback for their child's PLP. Please don't hesitate to contact me if you have any questions.

In finishing this fortnights report I would like to leave you with a quote to reflect on. 'Children must be taught how to think, not what to think'.

SEVEN NEW SCHOOL ZONE TRAFFIC OFFENCES



To help schools keep the school zone safer for all pedestrians and drivers there are seven new traffic infringements with new fines.

None of the seven offences attract demerit points when committed elsewhere on the road but in a school zone they each come with two points.

The changes are:

- ♦ Stopping in intersection - Under the changes if a driver commits this offence in a school zone they will receive a penalty of \$439 and 2 demerit points.
- ♦ Stop within 20m of intersection (traffic lights) - Under the changes if a driver commits this offence in a school zone they will receive a penalty of \$439 and 2 demerit points.
- ♦ Stop within 10m of intersection (no traffic lights) - Under the changes if a driver commits this offence in a school zone they will receive a penalty of \$439 and 2 demerit points.
- ♦ Stop near bicycle crossing lights - Under the changes if a driver commits this offence in a school zone they will receive a penalty of \$439 and 2 demerit points.
- ♦ Obstruct access to ramp/path/passageway - Under the changes if a driver commits this offence in a school zone they will receive a penalty of \$330 and 2 demerit points.
- ♦ Not parallel park in the direction of travel - Under the changes if a driver commits this offence in a school zone they will receive a \$330 fine and 2 demerit points.
- ♦ Parallel park close to dividing line - Under the changes if a driver commits this offence in a school zone they will receive a \$330 fine and 2 demerit points.

The CSP is a long-term plan that will identify the community's main priorities and expectations for the future, developed in partnership with the community and other key stakeholders. It is the highest level plan that a council and its community will prepare and must address social, environmental, economic and civic leadership priorities whilst responding to four key questions:

1. Where is Council now?
2. Where does Council want to be in 10 years?
3. How will Council get there?
4. How will Council know it has arrived?

The directions and strategies outlined in the CSP will then form the basis of Council's programs, projects and strategies.

The University of Technology – Sydney (UTS) have been engaged to facilitate the phone survey of over 260 residents and community workshops in conjunction with council. Feedback from the survey and the workshops will guide the objectives and activities for the new Federation Council Delivery Program from 1 July 2018 to 30 June 2021.


