Our students feel safe and secure at school and we are pro-active and responsive if any bullying does occur. However we should never rest in making sure that bullying and violence are not part of our school or our community. To achieve this, the school and community must continue to work together to put in place

positive strategies that minimizes the chances of bullying or violence occurring. In fact parents play a vital role in supporting the school's efforts to sustain our anti-bullying culture. Recently we welcomed Mrs Amber Clifton to Oaklands Central School as she takes on the role of Learning Support Teacher. This bolsters our Learning Support Team and continues to grow our capacity to assist students with their literacy and numeracy. The team assists teachers with implementing the Secondary Literacy Strategy / Super 6, where students are taught the core skills necessary for strong literacy. Our Learning Support Teachers and SLSOs provide direct support for students in the classroom. If students are identified as needing additional literacy support they are engaged in the Multi-Lit program. In this way we are supporting all students and staff across Oaklands Central to provide the strongest possible literacy program.

Remember to ask your child about their SMART goals and remember our literacy skill for the remainder of the term is summarising. I look forward to seeing how our students shine their lights over the rest of Term 1!

SEVEN NEW SCHOOL ZONE TRAFFIC OFFENCES



To help schools keep the school zone safer for all pedestrians and drivers there are seven new traffic infringements with new fines.

None of the seven offences attract demerit points when committed elsewhere on the road but in a school zone they each come with two points.

The changes are:

- ♦ Stopping in intersection - Under the changes if a driver commits this offence in a school zone they will receive a penalty of \$439 and 2 demerit points.
- ♦ Stop within 20m of intersection (traffic lights) - Under the changes if a driver commits this offence in a school zone they will receive a penalty of \$439 and 2 demerit points.
- ♦ Stop within 10m of intersection (no traffic lights) - Under the changes if a driver commits this offence in a school zone they will receive a penalty of \$439 and 2 demerit points.
- ♦ Stop near bicycle crossing lights - Under the changes if a driver commits this offence in a school zone they will receive a penalty of \$439 and 2 demerit points.
- ♦ Obstruct access to ramp/path/passageway - Under the changes if a driver commits this offence in a school zone they will receive a penalty of \$330 and 2 demerit points.
- ♦ Not parallel park in the direction of travel - Under the changes if a driver commits this offence in a school zone they will receive a \$330 fine and 2 demerit points.
- ♦ Parallel park close to dividing line - Under the changes if a driver commits this offence in a school zone they will receive a \$330 fine and 2 demerit points.

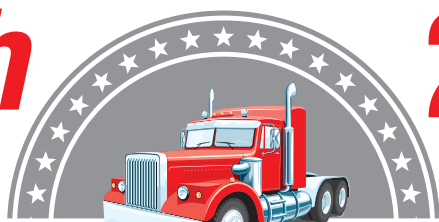

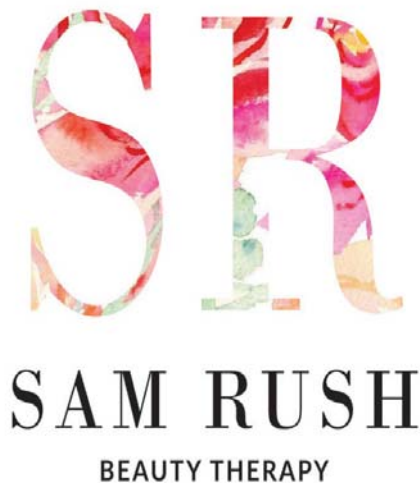
