## SCHOOL NEWS

### PRINCIPAL'S PERSPECTIVE

Dear Parents and Caregivers,

Every two weeks I have the pleasure of reflecting on how our students have been shining their lights. Our students and staff continually shine each and every day in a wide variety of ways. In the last two weeks many of our students have competed in a variety of sporting events including AFL Trials, an Interschool Chess competition and the Primary Zone Cross Country. While our students compete to win, I am continually told of their great sportsmanship and exemplary behaviour at these events. The Student Representative Council continue to display great leadership across the school. Demonstrating confidence, thoughtfulness and planning, the SRC have initiated the addition of beanies to the school uniform and organised the Bullying No-Way Mural. The mural demonstrates not only our commitment to minimising bullying, but is a great way to involve our students in sending a clear message. At last week's Whole School Assembly more than half of our students received their Silver Level Certificates. This is

a tremendous achievement that shows how the students strive to show respect, responsibility, resilience and safe behaviours. Other students step up by assisting with Breakfast Club on a regular basis and our students continue to shine in the classroom. Over the last few weeks I have had many of our students proudly show the learning tasks that they have been doing in class. The depth of learning and quality of their work is wonderful. So many of our students are quiet achievers. They shine their light by applying themselves in the classroom and learning even if it is a small step each day. Oaklands Central School enables our students to grow and achieve. So it is a pleasure to be part of a school where our students are shining their lights so brightly.

Successful schools are committed to continually improving practice through self-evaluation and growing staff expertise. We are fortunate to have such a committed and professional teaching team at Oaklands. Learning, teaching and leadership are our strategic directions. As part of these strategic directions we are working hard to improve student literacy and numeracy. To achieve this staff are undertaking a variety of professional learning. Last week three teachers participated in training in a

literacy program. The program, MacqLit, compliments the MultiLit program already successfully being used in the school. These programs, along with the reading and writing programs in our school, will support student achievement in literacy from K-12. We are also fortunate that as an Early Action for Success school, we are actively working with the new Literacy and Numeracy Progressions. These tools are invaluable in guiding the teaching of literacy and numeracy.

Winter has arrived. NSW Health has recently launched its WinterWise site, to encourage everyone to practice good habits to stay healthy during winter. Some of the advice given includes:

"Winter is a busy time for the health system with many people exposed to illnesses such as cold and flu. NSW Health is preparing for a potentially serious flu season and we urge the community to do the same by being winter wise.

Here are some tips to be winter wise this season:

#### Keep well

Good hygiene and behaviour can help reduce the spread of illness.

Here are some simple things to remember:

#### Catch it and bin it

Germs can spread easily. Always carry a tissue and use it to catch

your cough or sneeze. If you don't have a tissue, coughing into your elbow is better than your hands.

Germs can live for several hours on tissues. Throw used tissues in a rubbish bin as soon as possible.

#### Kill it

Hands can transfer germs to every surface you touch. Wash your hands thoroughly and often, especially after coughing, sneezing or blowing your nose.

Wash hands for at least 10 seconds or use an alcohol-based hand rub.

#### Stay at home

(If you are sick) wait at least 24 hours after your fever resolves before you return to work or other public activities so you do not infect others. Keep sick children away from school and other activities."

Please talk to your child about keeping fit and well during the winter months, so they can enjoy the cold weather and lots of learning at school.
